Greetings in the Lord,

Did you hear the one about the Rabbi and the New England minister who were getting to know each other? Proudly, the minister exclaimed, "One of my ancestors signed the Declaration of Independence," to which the Rabbi responded, "One of my ancestors signed the Ten Commandments." I can still remember the pride I felt when I discovered that one of my ancestors, Richard Stockton, was one of the original signers of the Declaration of Independence.

With the 4th of July coming soon, we can all be proud of the words penned in the Declaration of Independence. "When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bonds which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth the separate and equal station to which the laws of nature and of nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation." Thus begins the Declaration of Independence, signed in the Continental Congress on July 4, 1776. Did you know that this important document didn't come into being until a day of fasting and prayer had been called and observed beforehand by the members of the Continental Congress?

While I was in Washington DC last month for a Pastors' Conference, I was blessed to be able to attend a tour of the Capitol Building led by David Barton. During the three hours of the tour, he shared over and over the rich Christian heritage of our nation. I was both blessed and troubled. Blessed to hear of the spiritual legacy that our founders handed down to us and troubled to realize how far we as a nation had drifted from these biblical roots.

Through the following vision for our church, God has called us not only to fight to stop this drift, but to also reverse it:

"Inspired by God, our vision is an America that affirms and practices Christian values rooted in biblical authority. Empowered by God, we will be a church that awakens, informs, energizes, equips, and mobilizes Christians to be the catalysts for the biblically-based transformation of their families, churches, communities, and nation."

During the month of July, I will be preaching a sermon series entitled, "Sound the Alarm," to challenge us to live into God's vision for our church. Each sermon will be a clarion call for what God is wanting us to do:





HAPPY 4TH OF JULY

Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD, the people he chose for his inheritance.



The first session of the 2018 West Ohio Conference convened Sunday evening, June 3, at Lakeside with a laity (That's us, Folks!) session and an emphasis on the importance of sharing our talents. (Have you submitted a talent survey?) As essential as our clergy and staff are to the Church, we are all part of the body from which His hands and feet are extended. I was reminded of how grateful I am to be part of BUMC where so many give so much especially in terms of time and service But I also realize that the needs of our community and world keep changing; consequently, the discussion suggested that we may be called upon to serve in different ways.

We began and ended each day with worship, and the music accompanying each service was beautiful, varied, and a blessing. The theme for the 2018 Conference was, "Fear not; there is enough," and initially I assumed that it was inspired by verses such as Philippians 4:19: "But my God shall supply all your needs according to his glorious riches in Christ Jesus." Although Monday was dedicated to the business reports, nominations, and recognitions, by Tuesday having heard numerous speakers, it was evident that there was an assumption and another underlying message to the theme. The message seemed to infer that dissenting opinions were the result of a covetousness on the part of the dissenter prompting a reassurance that if we would agree with proposals, we would always be blessed with "enough" to share. Recommendation 6 entitled, "There is Enough for the Stranger," which


passed overwhelmingly for example, called for Methodists to support churches who offer sanctuary to illegals, a reminder perhaps that we pray for our lawmakers trying to find a way through this situation.

The good news is that there are some wonderful missions working in Ohio and worldwide through the Methodist Church. With the horrific 2017 hurricane season, we celebrated UMCOR's Disaster Response teams who distributed thousands of the flood buckets. According to the Mayor of Coalton, Ohio (near Jackson), the Methodist recovery teams were the answer to prayer last summer when their small town flooded, and the teams were a presence in Puerto Rico as well. Heath Initiatives and related programs affected as many as one million children around the world in the past year, and calls for the necessity for more prison ministry, addiction programs, and military suicide counseling were reported.

The assembly of the West Ohio Wesleyan Covenant Association was comforting as leadership emphasized that their goal was not division but to cling to and enforce the Book of Discipline based on Biblical teaching. We should be in prayer for the petitions which are due in July 8 to be presented in St. Louis on February 23-26, 2019. Thank you and remember to pray!

Summer Is Here—Be Safe at Home and at Work!

1) Understand SPF and Use Sun Protection

Know your SPF numbers and what sort of SPF protection to buy for your family. Extra-high SPF numbers aren't nearly so important as careful, effective application on all exposed skin.

2) Practice Proper Water Safety

A vast number of unfortunate summer deaths are caused by drowning. If you or your families are enjoying pool activities or water sports, always go in pairs and make sure that kids are under constant adult supervision.

3) Protect Against Mosquitos and Other Threats

Mosquitos carry some of summer's worst diseases (Lyme, Zika, etc.), but they are also very difficult to avoid without proper care. If you are going to be spending time near open water, especially standing water, protect yourself from mosquitos by covering arms and legs, and using effective repellents like deet. While bright colors are a good idea in the forest, in other environments try to stay away from bright or floral patterns, which are an attractor for stinging insects.

3) When It Heats Up, Plan Hydration Carefully

Dehydration is no fun at best and deadly at worst. If you are heading into hot temperatures, make clear plans for water. If it is particularly hot, make sure you frequently stop in the shade and take a drink of water to keep from sweating out too much.

4) Be More Careful in the Car

Summer is a more dangerous time to be on the road. The combination of drivers new to the area, drivers who may be acting more careless, and more bikers can lead to disaster. So remember to check your car, follow local traffic laws, stay safe on the road, and DO NOT LEAVE YOUR CHILD UNATTENDED IN THE CAR FOR A MINUTE! Within one minute your car can increase by ten degrees. Under no circumstance should your child or pet be left in a vehicle.
