Greetings in the Lord,

One of my favorite TV commercials used to be an old Snickers ad from several years ago in which a football ref is reading an eye chart while the eye doctor stands watching. "E, L, is that a small cow?" the ref asks. The eye doctor responds, "There are no cows on the chart." Then the scene cuts to the doctor's waiting room where a room full of different sports referees in their various striped jerseys are waiting for their turn to have their vision checked. We all laugh because the people who need to have good vision can barely see.

During my first six months at Bethel UMC, I felt something like those refs, at least spiritually speaking. Over that time, I was trying to see God's vision for our church. I'm not talking about our church mission, which is to make disciples for Jesus Christ. This is the same mission that Jesus gave our church and every other Christian church 2,000 years ago. But God's vision is different for each church. It is God's unique plan for how a church will accomplish what God wants them to do for His Kingdom. One church leader has defined vision as seeing the invisible and making it visible.

So that is what I prayed every day since I came to BUMC: "Please show me your vision for our church, Lord. Show me the invisible so that I may make it visible to your people." In II Kings, Elisha prays a similar prayer for his servant, Gehazi. They were surrounded by a great army of the enemy. What was visible were the horses and the chariots and the weapons of the enemy.

When the servant saw this, he was frightened. Because of this, Elisha prayed for his servant, "Oh God! Open his eyes that he may see" (II Kings 6:17), not the visible forces of the enemy around them, but rather the invisible power of God. Suddenly the servant could see the invisible but very real mighty Host of God's angel army that would fight this battle. Praise God for a vision that enables us to look away from the circumstances that beset us and to see beyond them to our Almighty God.

Through much prayer and discernment, God gave me His vision for our church, a vision so big that it could only be accomplished by the power of God's Holy Spirit working in and through us. I shared this vision from the pulpit during the month of January. My prayer is that we will each catch this new vision from God:

"Inspired by God, our vision is an America that affirms and practices Christian values rooted in biblical authority. Empowered by God, we will be a church that awakens, informs, energizes, equips, and mobilizes Christians to be the catalysts for the biblically-based transformation of their families, churches, communities, and nation."

In February, to help us catch this vision and to begin to live into it as a church, I will be teaching a class called **Vision Quest** on **Thursday evenings** at **6:30 p.m.**, **starting on February 1**. It will be both a

# Behind the Guitar .... Pastor Steve Fultz



James 1:27 "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world." (NIV)

Ahh, February, the unofficial month of love. Maybe no other month, with the exception of June, resonates as much with fond thoughts of care and emotions. When I was a kid, I remember sitting at the kitchen table the night before Valentine's Day and writing the names of all the kids in my class on inexpensive cards. We'd have some kind of box to put on our desk, and then kids would go around slipping the little cards into each other's container. Of course, I usually had a couple of special girls, so I'd make sure they got the biggest "Will you be my Valentine?" cards. It was genuine, heartfelt love, at least until recess. But I know how it felt not to get a card from someone special. I felt left out.

I know there were girls you didn't want to get that "special" Valentine from, and I'm sure the girls felt the same way about some of the boys. (Maybe most of the boys!) And I'm sure that even today, Valentine's Day is a difficult holiday for some. We tend to look at the world from our own perspective and think everyone has had similar experiences. But, reality is, we don't. As Christians, we should show more love to one another. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus touched on this in The Sermon on the Mount. In Chapter 7, verse 12, He says: "So in everything, do to others what you would have them do to you, for this sums up the Law and the **Prophets."** This ties in with what Luke wrote later. When Jesus was asked how to gain eternal life. He turned it back to the questioner: "He answered, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbor as yourself." (Luke 10: 27 NIV) Jesus said he had answered correctly. Pretty simple, right?

Now, you may be asking yourself, "What has this got to do with the Scripture from James?" From the time I arrived at Bethel UMC, I have heard how loving this church is and that all Pastor Crabtree preached about was Love. Well,

friends, that love was not visible a few months ago when one of our members passed away. They loved this church and the people in it, yet there were only a handful of people from the church who bothered to show up for the visitation or service. Dona and I were shocked. It wasn't the first time I had seen low numbers at a service, but it was one of the most drastic. The sad, or maddening, thing was that their nephew stood up at the service and talked about how much the person loved this church. Sorry, but the love wasn't returned (and still isn't being returned) to the widow, who doesn't know if she'll ever come back. We have let the things of the world get in front of the love we should have for the church. not the building, but the fellowship. I have stressed time and again that the church is the fellowship, not the structure.

We can't just love and care for our favorite people. What good is that? As Jesus said in Luke 6: 33: "And if you do good to those who are good to you, what credit is that to you? Even sinners do that." It's about caring for *all* those who know the Lord and their families.

I hope I haven't embarrassed this particular family; but the church should be not only embarrassed, but ashamed. I know that as I sat there, I was embarrassed, ashamed, and angry. Jesus followed up the comment about loving your neighbor with this, "You have answered correctly," Jesus replied. "Do this and you will live." (Lk. 10: 28) This isn't just a Bethel UMC issue; it crosses many fellowships. We can do better; we have to. Otherwise, we are no better than the world.

Over the years, I have seen many people welcomed into our fellowship, but we could still use a little more work. We are here to support one another. Consider how it would feel to be left out. This is the start of a new year and a new day. With God, all things are possible; you've got this! Have a wonderful Valentine's Day.

- Be kind to people who aren't kind to you.



**Facility Usage** 

Just a reminder when using a church property, the following procedure should be followed:

- 1. Contact the church office for availability of the facility.
- 2. Complete and agree to all parts of the application to use the church facility and give the completed form to the church secretary (Vicki Holland) to ensure your event gets on the church calendar.
- 3. Contact the custodial staff (Sandy and Greg Bauer) to discuss gaining access to the facility.
- 4. Be sure to clean up after your event, and dispose of all trash in the dumpster.
- 5. Secure the facility upon exiting the event, making sure that all doors are locked.
- 6. Church activities have first priority for the use of the building.





Maier from AED Brands, and Captain Chris Cooper from the Bethel-Tate Fire Department. Denise demonstrated a Zoll AED (Automated External Defibrillator) to the group and went over the pricing. Captain Chris Cooper gave us his recommendations.



The Red Cross believes that all Americans should be within four minutes of an AED and someone trained to use it. An AED is the only effective treatment for restoring a regular heart rhythm during sudden cardiac arrest and is an easy-to-operate tool for someone with no medical background.

The Trustees approved the purchase of the Zoll AED, along with training from the Bethel-Tate Fire Department. The AED has been ordered and will be mounted in the church by the end of January.

Other items that we are checking into are fire alarms in the Sanctuary and Multi-purpose room.



For people who prefer to serve God 'behind the scenes,' please join us at 9:00 a.m. on Saturday, March 24, as we gather to put out the white Easter crosses throughout Bethel. Then on Saturday, April 7, at 9:00 a.m., we again need volunteers to retrieve the crosses.


People Reaching People

# INANCE COMMITTEE



We ended 2017 on a blessed note! As you know, BUMC membership voted in the last quarter of the year to withhold all but \$1 of our remaining apportionments for 2017. With that in mind, our current fund balance for the end of 2017 was just over \$50,000. The amount of apportionments withheld was \$6,504; so if we

had sent that, we still would have over \$43,000 in our current fund. This is a balance that seems reasonable to have, based on the possible needs that could present themselves during the winter months (e.g., furnaces, higher fuel bills, etc.). We want to be responsible and ready if an unexpected situation presents itself.




The Missions Committee is thankful for the support of the BUMC congregation. It is heartwarming to recount successful missions in 2017 due to your generosity and caring.



# Don't Kick Dirt on the Bride!

(Following are excerpts from an article that appeared in the *Carrollton Columns*, written by Pastor Mark, Carrollton, KY UMC.)

I've given most of my life as a pastor of a local church. I've loved the people, and through the years I've grown in my desire to protect The Church. Like you, I hear many negative comments about The Church. The Church is not relevant. The Church is out of touch with society today. The Church isn't needed.

As I enter 2018, I think about the **positive influence** of The Church in America:

- The Frontier Church in America started 106 of the 108 colleges in the country.
- If you look at the hospitals in Louisville and Northern, KY, you'll discover they were mostly founded by Protestant and Catholic Churches.
- If you research inner-city missions and places for the homeless or elderly, you will uncover that they were started by The Church.
- Most of the volunteers who give their time do so through The Church.
- Who visits and conducts worship services in prisons in America? The Church. Who establishes crises pregnancy centers, suicide prevention centers, family counseling centers, and alcohol and drug treatment centers? The Church!
- Alcoholics Anonymous was started by two men who were influenced by the Oxford groups that promote spiritual values for daily living under the direction of an Episcopal clergyman, Dr. Samuel Shoemaker. The Church!
- In nearly every community there are free counseling ministries, generous food pantries, clothing closets, school back-pack programs,

free tutoring, generous food baskets at Thanksgiving, gifts and toys for both adults and children at Christmastime...all through The Church.

- And when it comes to national disasters, who are the first volunteers to arrive on the scene to help and the last to leave? The Church!
- What organization puts the greatest percentage of every dollar you donate towards a disaster into helping the affected area? The Church.
- As one prominent pastor wrote, "There's no way to measure the suicides prevented, divorces averted, and emotional or family problems corrected by the weekly ministry of local churches. How many marriages have been kept together? How many kids kept off drugs? How many crimes prevented because of the positive influence of godly people in The Church?
- Let's not forget that The Church teaches our young people moral values and the basis for those values.

When I see The Church portrayed in the media as a group of mindless, irrational, out-of-touch-with-reality people, I want to take out a full-page ad in rebuttal. Where would the world be today without The Church? I'll admit it's far from perfect, but before you criticize The Church, remember it's the bride of Christ. Although the bride has some blemishes and a few age spots, the loving groom sees her "without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish" (Ephesians 5:27). As I told someone the other day, "Don't kick dirt on the Bride of Christ."

So, when you resolve to start the New Year off in a positive direction, plan to make a difference in peoples' lives in the best possible way—through your involvement in The Church.

# **Relationships by God's Design**

- Proverbs 29:17 "Discipline your children; you'll be glad you did—they'll turn out delightful to live with." (MSG)
- Colossians 3:21 "Parents, don't come down too hard on your children or you'll crush their spirits." (MSG)

One of the roles of a parent is that of disciplinarian. Dr. James Dobson says, "An effective parent has to learn the difference between punishment and discipline." He presented the following chart to clarify the differences:

	PUNISHMENT	DISCIPLINE
Purpose	To inflict penalty for an offense	To train for correction and maturity
Focus	Past misdeeds	Future correct acts
Attitude	Hostility and frustration on the part of the parent	Love and concern on the part of the parent
Resulting emotion in the child	Fear and guilt	Security

Dobson uses the gospel of grace to illustrate it. He says, "As Christians, we benefit from God's grace and mercy when we don't get the punishment we deserve for our sins. It makes no sense for me to fellowship with God on the basis of mercy and with my children on the basis of judgment. Since Jesus took the punishment, my role as a parent is not to punish them. My role is to provide appropriate consequences and instruction to help them see how their behavior displeases God and to teach them how to cooperate with God's work in their lives."
